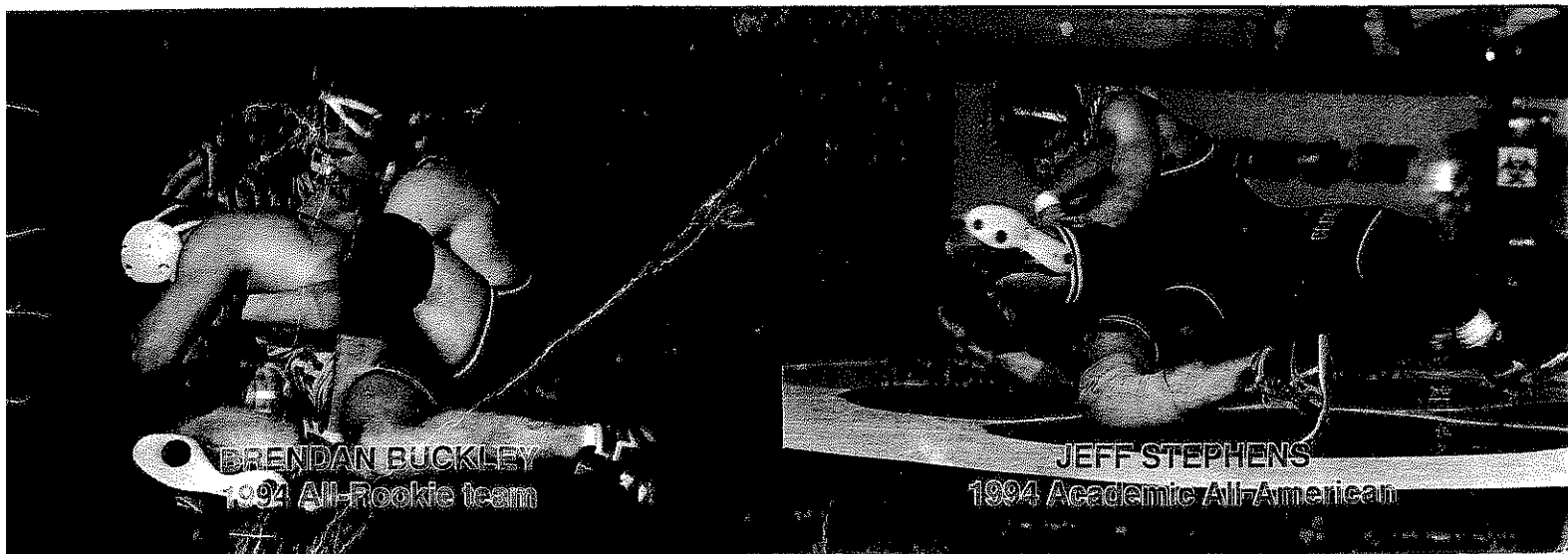

VICKERY HALL

Clemson is proud to provide the best of facilities for all phases of its athletic program, from competition sites, to practice fields, to the strength training and training rooms. Vickery Hall is no exception, as the \$3 million structure is as impressive aesthetically as any of the other facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to the Clemson University Athletic Department is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs the building houses.

The philosophy behind Vickery Hall is to provide the Clemson student-athlete with a program that will meet his or her needs academically, in personal growth and development, and with career assistance. Vickery Hall is tangible evidence that, at Clemson, the athletic department has made a commitment to make the student-athlete's total experience a rewarding one.

The two-story, 27,000-square-foot Vickery Hall is located on Clemson's east campus and is open throughout the day and into the evening to accommodate the extended schedules of student-athletes. It is the first facility in the country originally constructed for the purposes of meeting the comprehensive needs of student-athletes.

The structure has 11 classrooms and 28 tutorial rooms, along with a computer facility that houses 30 personal computers for hands-on computer tutoring, word processing and other general uses. A 175-seat auditorium is used for classes, guest speakers, meetings, and review sessions. It is also the site of many guest lectures the athletic department provides for its athletes on subjects that range from money management to media relations.

The mission of Vickery Hall is to function as a comprehensive support system to address the various transitional needs of student-athletes and in turn, give each individual the opportunity to make the most out of his or her college experience. Vickery Hall operates under the guidelines and policies of the university and the center's staff adheres strictly to the rules and ethical conduct standards of the university. The staff consists of the director, six full-time advisors, two graduate assistants and 50 tutors.

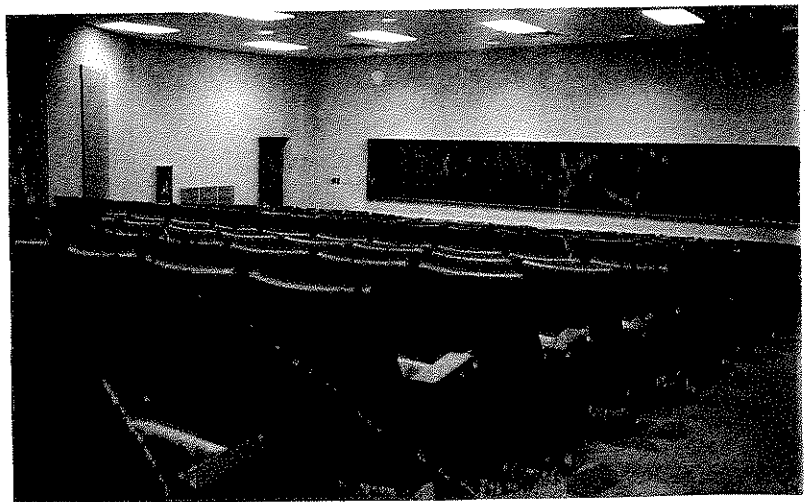
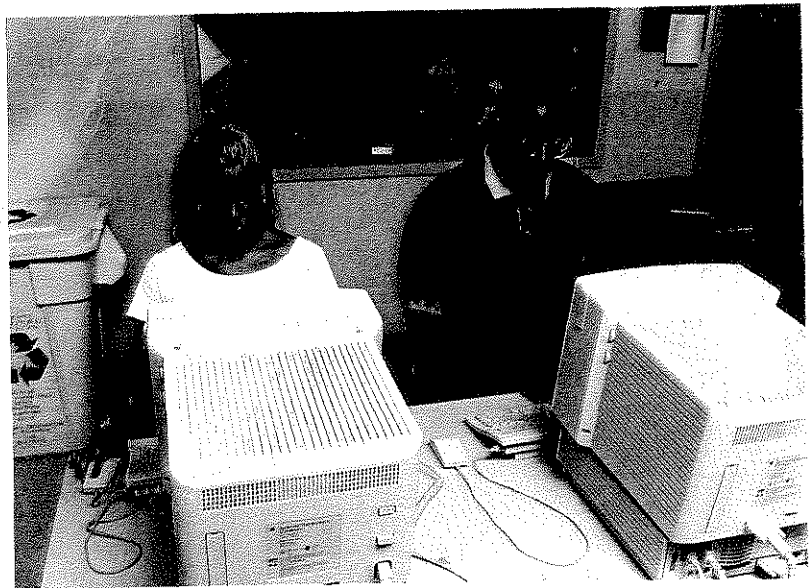
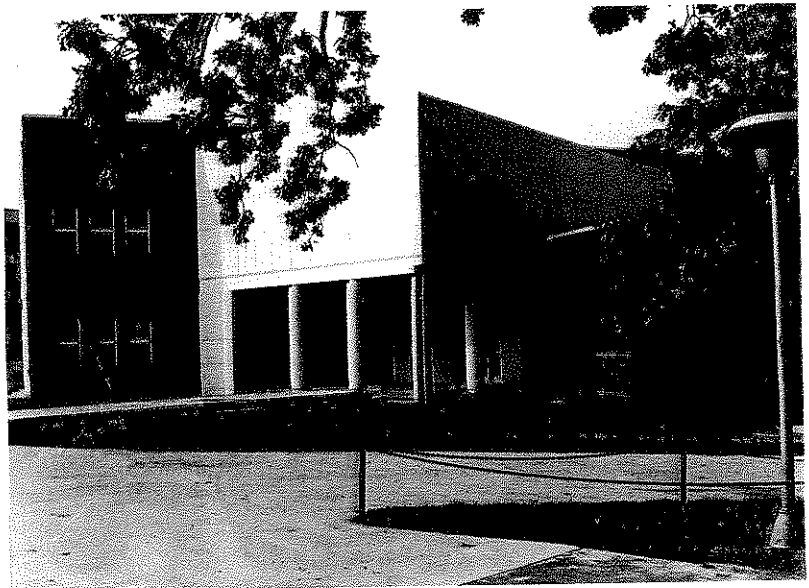

1994 Outlook



The 1994-95 season will feature many new faces in the Tiger lineup as seven of the 10 starters from last year's team have graduated.

"We will be a very young team this year, but we are also very talented," said third-year head coach Gil Sanchez, who has taken Clemson to its only top 15 national finishes in the program's history. "We lost two All-Americans in Sam Henson and Tim Morrissey who won a combined 68 matches last season. Also, we will miss four other wrestlers with NCAA experience. Last year's group was the most successful group of wrestlers ever at Clemson, but this year's group has the tools and we expect big things from them in the future."

The 1994 recruiting class was ranked 12th in the **Amateur Wrestling News**, but Sanchez feels that the ranking was low because of where the recruits came from.

"This is definitely one of the most talented groups to come to Clemson in some time. Our recruiting class was ranked only 12th because several of the guys came from lesser wrestling states. The talent is definitely there though, technically they may need work and they must mature, but physically they are extremely talented athletes. To work with a group like this is great because they pick things up quickly and they develop twice as fast, they are good kids and they are going to go a long way."

Heading the freshman class are high school All-Americans Clay Cavanaugh from South Carolina, Rob Daly from Florida, Scott Kurtz from Pennsylvania, James Short from North Carolina and Charlie Higdon from Florida. Cavanaugh, Daly, and Short were each named their state's Wrestler-of-the-Year, making this year's class one of the most recognized groups ever at Clemson. Kurtz will see action at 150 this year, while the other newcomers will be red-shirted.

This year's freshman class joins six red-shirt freshmen making this year's squad an inexperienced group at the college level. "Last year we had a large group of seniors so we could red-shirt eight wrestlers. That allowed those red-shirted athletes to train with the older wrestlers, gain experience and skill. You can tell that last year has paid off because they have a better work ethic and an understanding of what it takes to be successful at the college level.

"Because we are so young as a team we made our schedule more spread out. We have more time for the team to regroup, and get some rest in this year's schedule. We still have some difficult matches, for instance Nebraska, but there is more time in between contests.

"Early in the season we open with two tournaments, which will be difficult, but then we have some time off, which is different from last year. With the previous team we could have several hard matches in a row because we were experienced and had great depth, but this year we are very young so we have to give them more time to recover and drill as they will continue to learn about the college style of wrestling." The Tigers will open with The Citadel on November 13, before participating in the Las

Vegas Collegiate Championships on November 25.

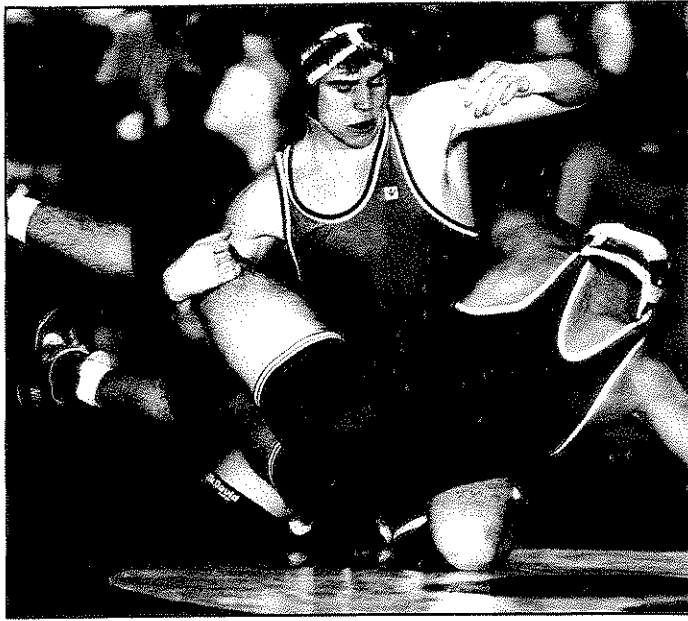
What will help this year's team is the experiences the returnees had training with last year's squad. "Losing a team like last year's opens the door for the younger kids. I wish that we had more experienced people to replace the ones we lost, but eventually the younger wrestlers must step up. They are a very talented group, I wish we could just have more time to prepare them. People like Tim Morrissey and Sam Henson are very difficult to replace. Their intensity in workouts and their dedication to the sport was impressive. Last year's group of seniors all had great skill, experience, and dedication which made them very successful. We hope some of that rubbed-off on the younger guys last year and it will carry over to this season."

By weight class:

118- The Tigers lost the most successful Tiger wrestler in the team's history with the departure of two-time national champion Sam Henson at the 118 pound weight class. Henson went 71-0 during his two seasons as the Tigers 118 pounder. This year Clemson will look to Academic All-American Jeff Stephens (30-25-2 career record) to take over the weight class as he moves down a division. "We will look for Jeff Stephens to be the 118 pounder. We feel that the move down from 126 will help him be nationally competitive. He does not quite have the size and leverage to be as effective at 126. With his technique and style he was very competitive at 126 but at 118 he will be more successful." Tim Nininger and James Jones will also see time at the 118 pound weight class.

126- With the move of Stephens to 118 pounds, red-shirt freshman Brent Taney will see a lot of time as a 126 pounder. "Brent Taney showed a lot of improvement thanks to a red-shirt year last season. He has made great strides since coming to Clemson and we hope to see that continue. We will use Jeff Stephens in certain situations at 126 depending on the matchups."

134- Jason Wheeler, a veteran of 46 matches the last four years, returns to the 134 pound weight class after his season was cut short for personal reasons. He is Clemson's lone senior starter in the projected lineup. "Jason Wheeler is probably one of the most athletic individuals on the team and he is one of the strongest athletes at Clemson. He is a front runner and an All-America candidate in our eyes."

142- All-Rookie team member Brendan Buckley (18-15 last year) will again hold this weight class. Buckley was outstanding as a freshman winning more matches than any freshman in three seasons. "Brendan Buckley is an All-America candidate. He was very successful last year and we look for him to build from that this season. He has shown great leadership and was elected one of this year's captains even though he is only a sophomore. He shows a lot of promise and will be right up there among the best nationally in his weight class."

150- The Tigers will go with true freshman Scott Kurtz at the 150 pound weight class. "He is a blue chip recruit with a ton of potential. Because we are very young at this weight class, he will be asked to step in right away and learn on the job. It will be a challenge for him, but we feel that he will be ready."

158- Paul Seim, who finished fourth in the ACC's at the 167 weight class, will move to the 158 division. "We decided to drop Paul down a weight class because he is better suited as a 158 pounder. Last year he was young

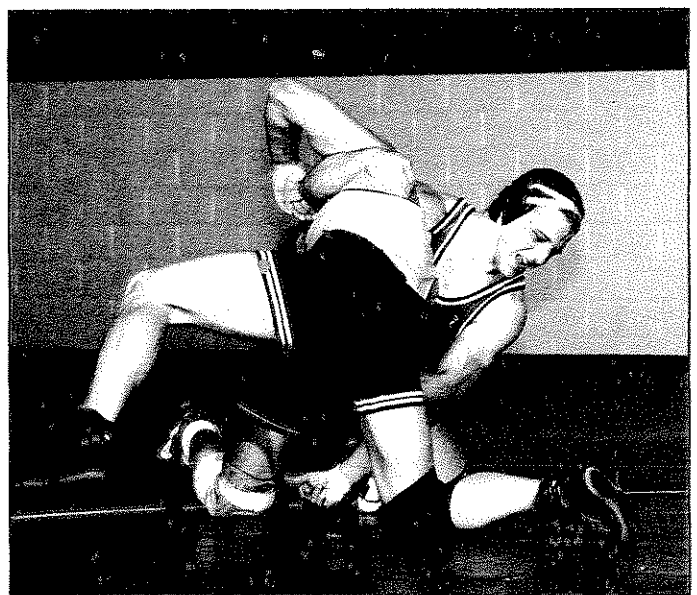
and inexperienced, which made for a long season for Paul, but he matured a lot and is still developing as a wrestler. One thing that we know is that Paul will always give 100%."

167- Derek Strobel is the front runner at the 167 pound weight class. "We are so young from the 167 weight class on up that we are not sure what will happen from week to week. At 167 Derek has shown improvement and is a tough competitor." Backing up red-shirt freshman Derek Strobel at 167 will be James Patterson, a true freshman who may also red-shirt.

177- Scott Engel will be the Tigers' 177 pounder after red-shirting last season. Engel has seen time as the Tigers' 190 pounder and at heavyweight (21 matches in 1992-93) during his career, but has settled into his more natural weight class of 177 this year. "Scott did not have the size that was really needed at the top weight classes, but he gave 100 percent for us. Now we have him at his true weight class and we feel that he will be successful as a 177 pounder." Challenging Engel will be Brian Collier who was red-shirted last year.

190- Aaron Strobel (who was in just two matches in 1993) will be the Tigers' 190 pounder this year, as he takes over for ACC Champion and All-American Tim Morrissey. Last year Morrissey went 31-5 on his way to a third-place finish in the NCAA Tournament, but has since graduated, which opened the door for Strobel. Strobel is the older brother of Clemson's 167 pounder Derek Strobel. "It will be difficult to replace Tim, but Aaron has worked hard in the off season and has really improved. He has been helped by working out with Morrissey and has learned a great deal."

HWT- Matt Kim, a red-shirt freshman from Pennsylvania, will be the Tigers heavyweight. "Matt is very talented. He knows how to wrestle, but like most of our team, he is inexperienced. We feel that he will develop into a very good heavyweight at Clemson."

Head Coach Gil Sanchez



Under the leadership of Head Coach Gil Sanchez the Clemson Tigers have had the two most successful seasons in the program's 18-year history.

The Tigers finished seventh last year in the NCAA Tournament and Sam Henson, the 1994 National Champion at 118, and Tim Morrissey were named All-Americans. It was the best finish ever for a Clemson squad and just the second time Clemson has had two All-Americans in the same year. The Tigers also finished second in the ACC Tournament with three individual champions, tying for the best mark in both categories by a Clemson team.

In 1993 Sanchez completed one of the most impressive rookie coaching campaigns ever in Clemson's athletic history. He was only the fourth coach in the Tigers' history (regardless of the sport) to lead a team to a top 20 finish in the first season.

Under Sanchez the Tigers finished 13th at the NCAA meet and third in the ACC Tournament and compiled a 13-9-1 record. The Tigers also had their second national champion, Sam Henson, in the team's 18-year history. Due to these accomplishments, Sanchez was the runner-up for the Rookie Coach-of-the-Year honors as chosen by **Amateur Wrestling News**.

In the 1991-92 season Sanchez served as an assistant coach at Clemson. He also served as an assistant coach at the University of Nebraska (Lincoln) for four seasons before coming to Tigertown.

In the summer of 1991 while competing on the international scene, Sanchez won the 1991 Canada Cup Championship in Toronto. He also participated in dual meets against Cuban, Russian and Korean teams. He was third in the World Team Trials Freestyle at the 136.5 pound weight class. He was formerly ranked third in the U.S. at 136.5 class and was a United States National Team member.

This past summer Sanchez was named as one of two coaches for the National Wrestling Coaches Association International All-American All-Star Team which competed in Germany. "It was a great experience to work with the top young wrestling talent in the country. We were able to train with the German National Team at their Olympic training centers. I am looking forward to next summer when I will be the team's leader. I hope to have some Tigers on the squad this year."

Sanchez will continue to use his great experiences wrestling and as a coach to motivate and develop his team. "The student-athletes know that I am very committed to team excellence and to the sport of wrestling. They see the enthusiasm that I, along with the other coaches, have and it rubs off on them.

"I plan to challenge each one of my wrestlers athletically as well as academically to be the best they can. This will, not only help them as individuals, but also

improve the team as a whole. Our main job is to produce and develop young men to reach their highest potential academically and athletically. We are striving to be a national power. This is being done by getting talented recruits and developing them as wrestlers through hard work."

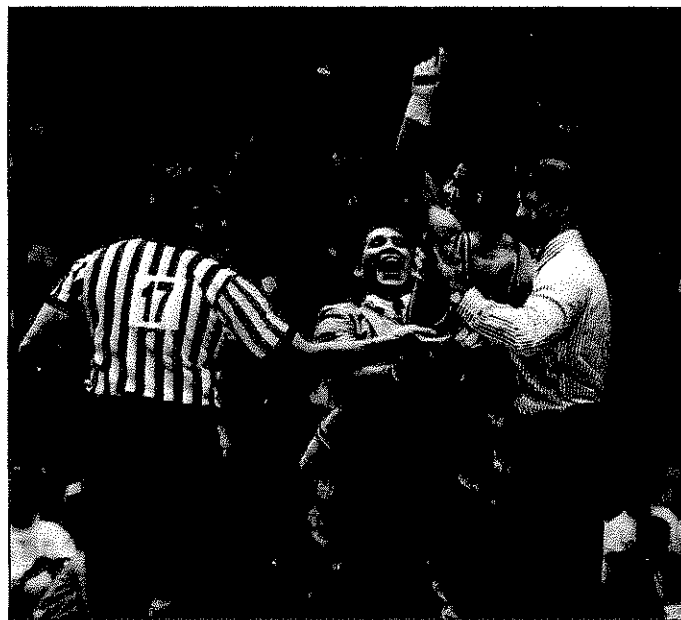
Sanchez was an All-American and NCAA runner-up for the University of Nebraska in 1987 at the 134 weight classification. He was also an All-Big 8 Academic selection. Sanchez was the last collegiate wrestler to beat Olympic Champion John Smith. He won 11-6 when Nebraska faced Oklahoma State in 1987.

Sanchez received his B.S. degree in education from Nebraska in 1988. A graduate of Cheyenne Central High School in Wyoming, he was a two-time state champion in wrestling and a high school All-American as well as a United States Sports Festival Champion in 1981.

Sanchez is single, and is currently working on his master's in education administration.

Assistant Coach Scott Turner



Scott Turner came to Clemson following four seasons as an assistant coach at NC State. Turner coached from 1988 to 1992 at NC State and the Wolfpack won three ACC Championships in this time period.

"We have a first-rate athletic department at Clemson, which offers us a great deal of support. I feel with this continued support we can escalate the Clemson wrestling program to a consistent top 10 level.

Our philosophy is to recruit and produce

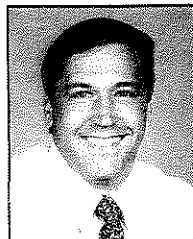
quality student-athletes who can be successful in wrestling and in every day life."

Turner is a graduate of NC State where he wrestled four years. He was an ACC Champion in 1984 at 142 and was named outstanding wrestler for that ACC Tournament. He was also the ACC Champion in 1985 and 1988 at 150 and earned All-America status twice. In 1988 he was the NCAA Tournament champion at the 150 weight class. He also earned the honor as the NCAA Outstanding Wrestler in the Tournament. Scott Turner was awarded the H.C. Kennett Award in 1988. This award is given to the Outstanding Student-Athlete at NC State. He was ranked fifth at the 163-pound weight class for the United States Freestyle team in 1990.

A graduate of Bethlehem-Freedom High School in Pennsylvania in 1983, Turner was a three-time letter winner in football and lettered four times in wrestling. He placed as high as third in the Pennsylvania wrestling Tournament.

Turner is presently single and recently completed his master's in Forest Resources

Atlantic Coast Conference Wrestling Information

This marks the 42nd year of wrestling in the Atlantic Coast Conference. In 1954, Maryland, Duke, North Carolina, N.C. State, and Virginia competed in the inaugural season with Maryland winning the first ever conference championship. In 1955 Wake Forest added a wrestling team which lasted only six seasons. The Tigers entered in 1976 while Georgia Tech joined in 1980. The Tigers continued their program ever since; however, Georgia Tech dropped wrestling in 1987. The following are some of the team and individual wrestling accomplishments in the ACC.

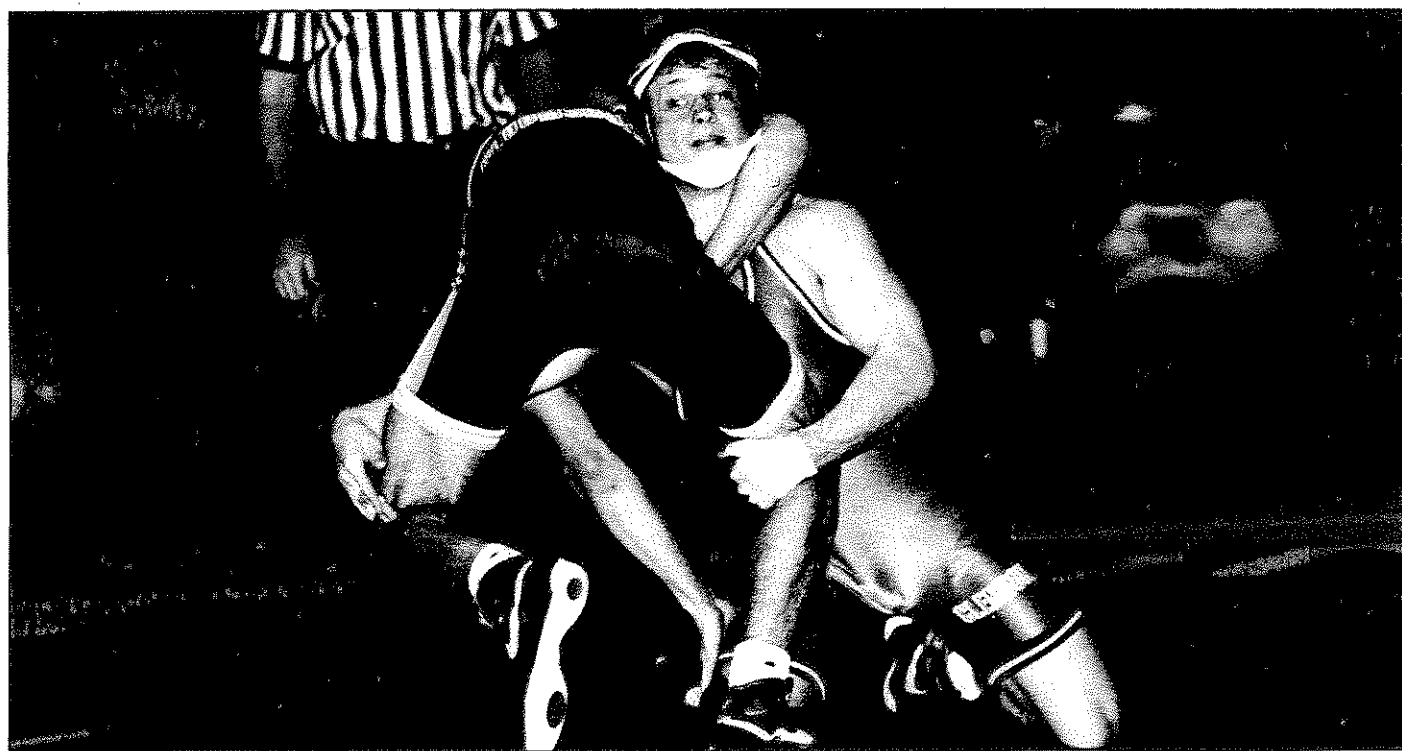

Wrestling History



Wrestling has been a varsity sport at Clemson since 1975, and is the youngest men's sport in Tigertown. Yet it has been among the most successful in the school's history and has already produced two national champions.

Noel Loban won the program's first national championship at the 190-pound weight class at the NCAA Championships in 1980. Loban became the first individual national champion in any sport at Clemson. In 1984, he went on to become Clemson's first alumnus to win an Olympic medal in an individual sport as he took the bronze medal in the 90 Kg class at Los Angeles.

Representing England, Loban defeated Clarke Davis of Canada, 4-2 to capture the third-place award. Loban still holds many records at Clemson. Loban had an 86-14 career record, still one of the top five percentages in ACC history. For his efforts, he was honored in 1991 as a member of the Clemson University Athletic Department Hall of Fame. The second National Champion was crowned last season when Sam Henson won the 118-pound title this past season.

After two non-winning seasons in 1975-76 and 1976-77, the 1977-78 Clemson team ran off a 15-3 dual-meet record, still the school's best winning percentage. That was the first of 17 straight seasons on the winning side of the ledger, a streak that is still active heading into the 1994-95 season.

The 1977-78 team was led by Larry Cohen and Rick Drury, Clemson's first ACC champions. In 1979, Loban led the Tigers to that second-place finish in the meet held in Littlejohn Coliseum. He was named the outstanding wrestler of the 1979 meet.

Coach Eddie Griffin arrived in Tigertown in 1984 and his impact was felt immediately. Despite losing most of the wrestlers who had led Clemson to a 15-4 record and an NCAA high 86 pins the previous year, Griffin took Clemson to a second-place ACC finish and a 9-6 dual meet record against one of the toughest schedules in Clemson history.

Included in the victories were triumphs over Oregon State and Brigham Young. The Beavers came into the Thanksgiving evening match ranked eighth in the nation and it was Griffin's first dual match at Clemson. Clemson sent five wrestlers to the NCAAs that year, more than any other ACC school that season.

Griffin's first full fledged recruiting class, the class of '85, ranked eighth according to **Amateur Wrestling News**, and led Clemson to a dual-meet ranking of number-11 in the nation. That 1985 team had a 14-5 worksheet and two more Tigers captured ACC titles as Florida native Joey McKenna won his second ACC title and Mark Litts took first-place honors in his weight class.

In 1985-86 the Tigers were ranked 19th in the final dual-meet poll and placed 20th in the NCAA meet. McKenna became Clemson's second All-American with a fourth-place finish at 150 pounds.

The Tigers, hampered with injuries, managed an 8-7 record in 1986-87. Doug Stainaker won the ACC championship at the 190 classification and represented Clemson, as did heavyweight Brian Raber, at the NCAA wrestling meet.

The Tigers finished with an 11-5 mark in 1987-88 and sent three wrestlers to the NCAAs. The most successful freshman that year was Donnie Heckel, as he captured the ACC crown at 118.

In 1988-89, the Tigers set a school record, placing six wrestlers (Donnie Heckel, Kurt Howell, Mike Bodily, Bill Orr, Kurt Rosenberger and Bryan Bittle) in the NCAA tournament. Clemson finished 13-9 overall and 3-2 in the ACC regular season.

In 1989-90, Clemson sent six wrestlers to the NCAA meet in College Park, MD (Donnie Heckel, Kurt Howell, Mike Bodily, Bill

Domasky, Dave Miller and Scott Williams). Clemson finished the year with a 10-6 record overall, and 3-2 in conference action.

In 1990-91, Clemson's Donnie Heckel was named the 1991 ACC Wrestler-of-the-Year, while coach Griffin was named the Co-Coach-of-the-Year by the coaches in the Atlantic Coast Conference. It also marked the first time in Clemson wrestling history that the Tigers came away with both awards. Griffin guided the Tigers to a 10-2-1 dual meet mark, including a perfect 5-0 mark in ACC action as Clemson won its first ever regular season conference title. The Tigers also sent five wrestlers to the NCAA Meet, as seniors Kurt Howell (126) and Donnie Heckel (118) came away with All-America honors.

Troy Bouzakis opened the 1991-92 season with a 19-match winning streak. The Tigers finished with a 10-6 record in 1991-92 with a 2-3 mark in the ACC. Mike Miller, John Gardner, Keith Turner and Scott Williams went to the NCAA Meet.

After serving as an assistant coach for one season, Gil Sanchez was named head coach in the summer of 1992. He enjoyed a great season in his first year as the Tigers' head coach as Clemson went 13-9-1 in the 1992-93 season including a 13th place finish at the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers were led by Sam Henson who captured the 118-pound national championship. Henson became the first Tiger to go undefeated during a season with a 34-0 record.

The Tigers had three ACC Champions for the first time in the history of the program. Sam Henson won the 118-pound crown, Troy Bouzakis captured the 126 title, and Tim Morrissey earned the 177 pound championship. For all three wrestlers it was their first trip to the ACC Tournament.

Clemson enjoyed one of its finest seasons last year as it had its highest finish ever at the 1994 NCAA Tournament with a seventh-place showing. Sam Henson led the way again as he became only the fourth Tiger athlete, regardless of the sport, to win more than one national championship, as he captured the 118 pound championship in the NCAA Tournament for the second year in a row. Henson finished his career with a 71-0 record at Clemson. Tim Morrissey also had a strong performance at Nationals, earning All-America honors with a third-place finish at the 190 pound weight class. Morrissey joined Henson as a 30-match winner with a 31-5 record.

Clemson finished second in the 1994 ACC Tournament with three individual champions. Sam Henson (118), Mike Mammon (150), and Tim Morrissey (190) each won their respective weight classes. Following the tournament Henson was named ACC-Wrestler-of-the-Year. During the regular season the Tigers went 14-6 with a 3-2 mark in the ACC, which tied for second place in the conference.

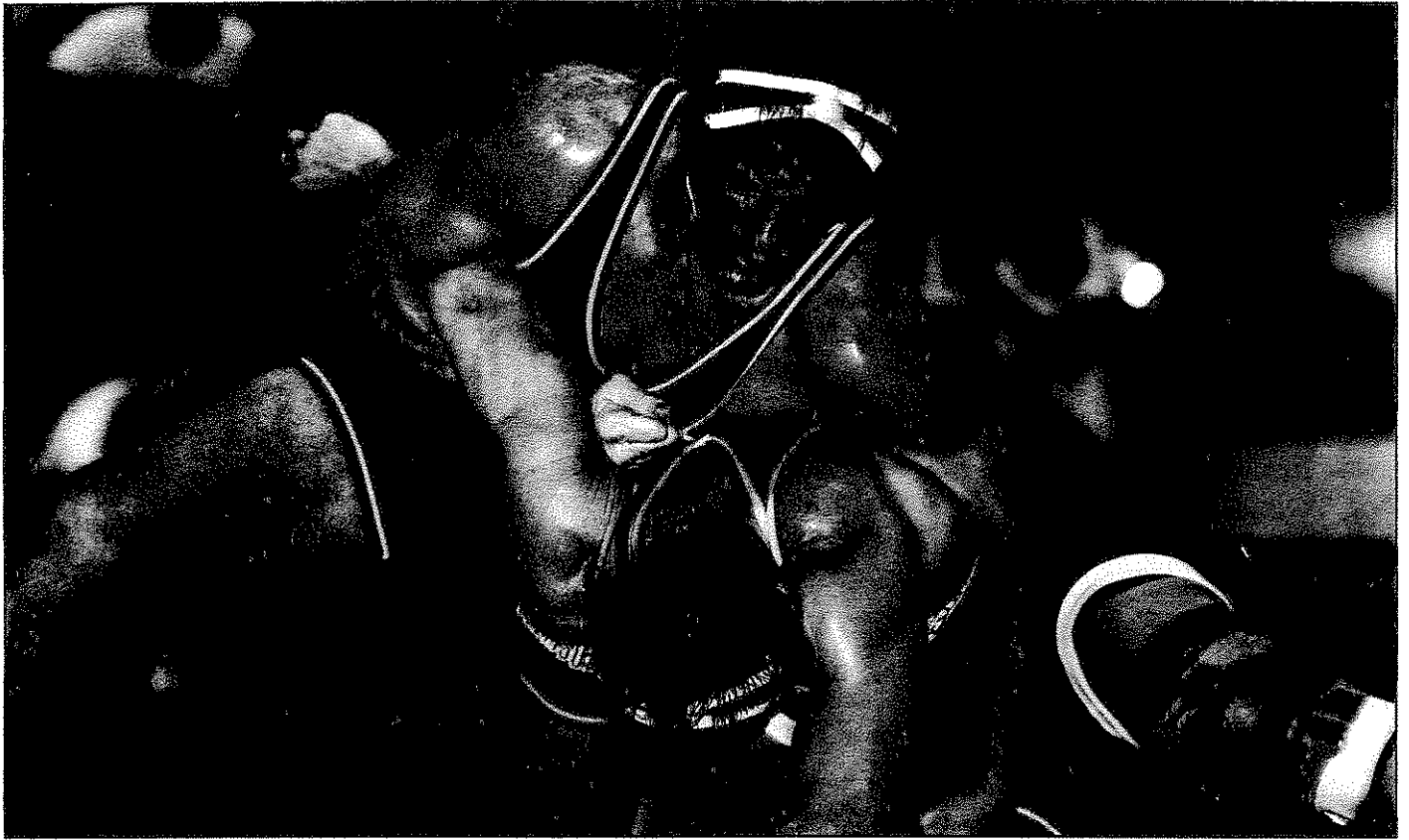

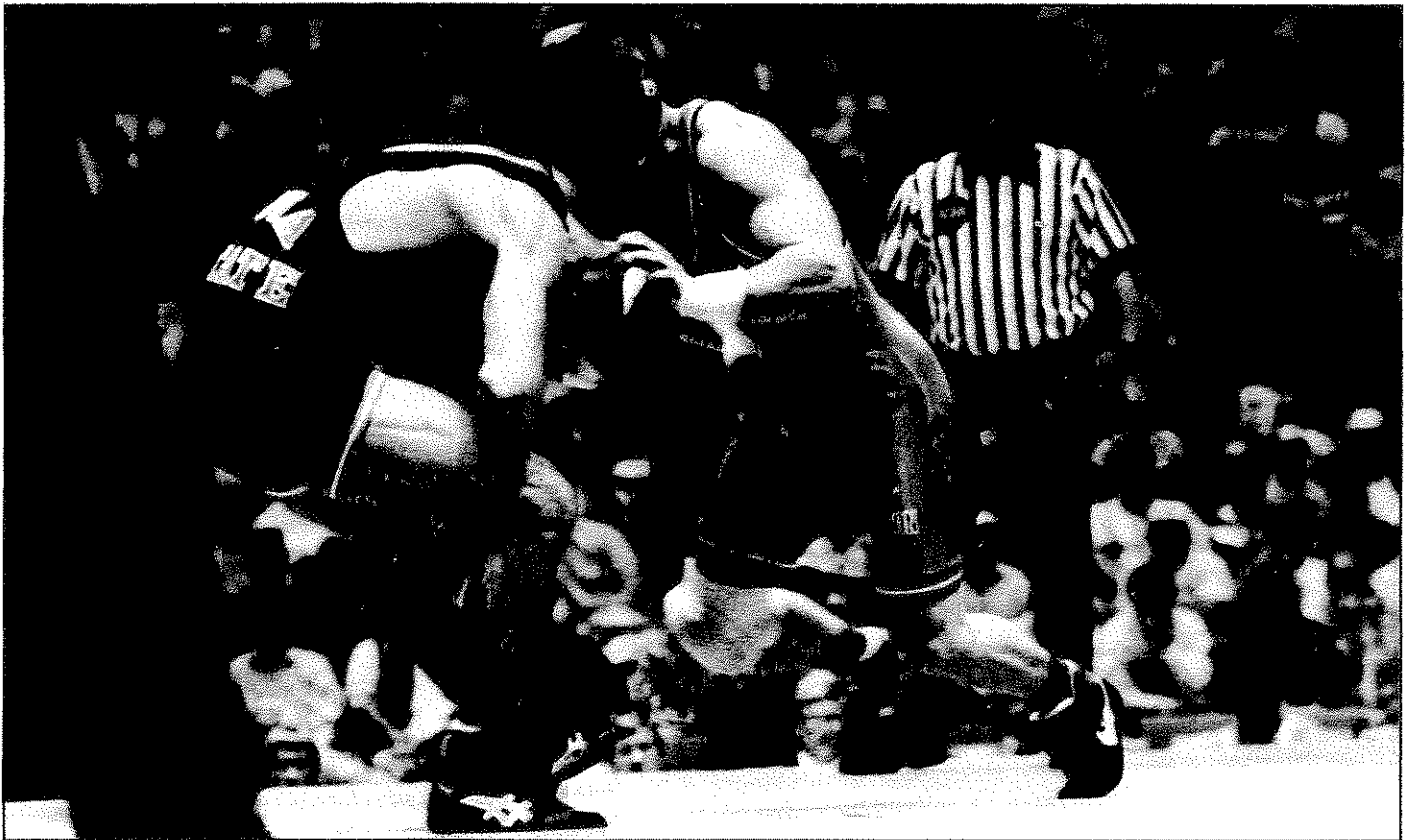

Clemson University's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the very best of facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium, to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all 19 of Clemson's varsity sports have the very best in facilities for training and competition. Vickery Hall is no exception, as the \$3 million structure is as impressive aesthetically as any of the other facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to the Clemson University Athletic Department is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall opened in the spring of 1991 and is the first facility in the nation originally constructed for the purpose of meeting the comprehensive needs of student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000-square-foot building is open throughout the day and into the evening to accommodate the extended schedules of student-athletes, and consolidates a variety of academic services for their use.

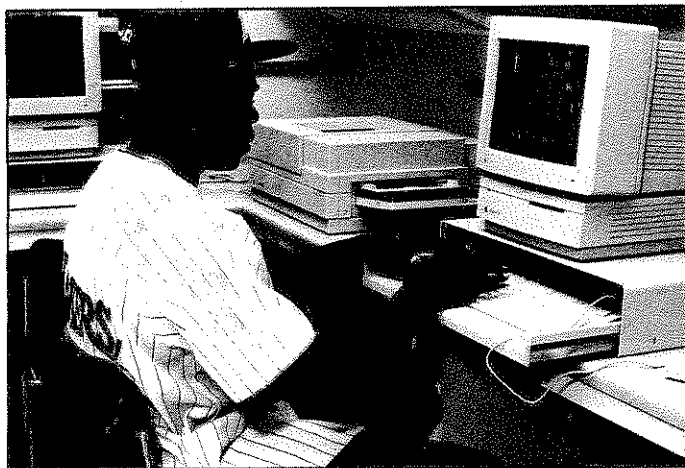
The philosophy behind Vickery Hall is to provide the Clemson student-athlete with a program that will meet his or her needs academically, in personal growth and development, and with career assistance. Vickery Hall is tangible evidence that, at Clemson, the athletic department has made a commitment to make the student-athlete's total experience a rewarding one, even after he or she enters the professional world.

"Vickery Hall is one of the most important facilities the Clemson University Athletic Department has ever built or will ever build. It makes a philosophical statement about the institutional commitment - giving our student-athletes the same opportunity to achieve their full potential academically that we give them athletically. We're very serious about that," said Athletic Director Bobby Robinson.

Given the time pressures of athletic participation and practice, student athletes face a difficult balancing act in trying to perform well both on the playing field and in the classroom. With respect to this, Clemson's Student-Athletic Enrichment Services (SAES), has provided one of the best academic support and advising programs in the nation over the last several years. The completion of Vickery Hall gives SAES an even greater opportunity to help student-athletes reach the short-term goal of graduation and the long-term goal of success in the world. The facility is open throughout the day and into the evening to accommodate the extended schedules of the student-athlete.

Vickery Hall is located in the mainstream of east campus, behind Jordan Hall at the top of Bryan Mall. The main entrance to the building is a 1,570-square foot reception/office area, comprised of five advisers' offices, two graduate student offices, and a conference room. Also located on the bottom floor is the office of Bill D'Andrea, the director of Clemson's student-athlete enrichment program.

The building also boasts a 175-seat auditorium to be used for classes, team meetings, review sessions, and seminars. The various speakers and lecturers who come to work with Clemson student-athletes as part of the student-enrichment program also use this facility. The auditorium is

equipped with a projection booth and state-of-the-art audio and video equipment and will be available to other campus groups when not in use by Student-Athletic Enrichment.

Another area of the main floor, the computer resources area, consists of a general computer tutoring room and a computer science tutoring room. The computer room contains 30 personal computers for hands-on computer tutoring, word processing and other general uses.

The 13,000-square-foot study and tutoring area on the second floor comprises the majority of the center. This area contains 11 classrooms and 28 tutorial rooms, including a large 65-seat study room and nine 20-seat study rooms, which are designed as classrooms with freestanding desks.

Tutoring

The athlete's relationship with the academic advising staff begins when she visits Clemson as a recruit. A member of the staff meets with a recruit and explains the program. If a recruit knows what curriculum he plans to pursue, a faculty member from that college meets with and counsels the recruit on his choice. If a recruit is undecided about that choice, the academic advising staff meets with him and gives the athlete a general overall view of the academic programs available at Clemson.

After a student enters Clemson as an athlete, he enters a continuous tutoring and advising program. This program involves a required study hall for all incoming freshmen and all other student-athletes with less than a 2.0 cumulative grade-point average.

Study hall is held five nights a week for two hours each night in Vickery Hall. The tutoring program is available to all student-athletes and is used by not only those who are having difficulty, but also those who excel. Tutors are generally graduate students or local teachers, tutoring in a field they are pursuing as a career or for a post-graduate degree.

More than 80 tutors are guided by the academic advising staff. This staff aids in arranging block schedules for athletes to help accommodate their busy schedules.

Student-Athlete Career Assistance Program

The Student-Athlete Career Assistance Program is one of the most important programs provided by the staff of Vickery Hall. The philosophy of this program is to provide help in securing summer employment and to aid in meeting long-term career goals.

By using the resources available to the University, Alumni Center and the Athletic Department, Bill D'Andrea is working to establish a network of businesses, companies, and executives who will help assist with The Summer Employment Assistance Program. The program's main goal is to provide the student-athlete with a job experience and a work history, which he can apply to his academic discipline.

The Long Term Career Assistance Program will be coordinated from the academic colleges, the Placement Center, and through Athletic Department contacts. This program is designed to better prepare the student-athlete for full-time employment and will focus on resume writing and interview techniques so that each student-athlete will be competitive and aggressive when dealing with companies who visit the Clemson campus.

Personal Growth Program

Another aspect of Clemson University's commitment to help student-athletes reach their potential in all areas of their life - academically, athletically, and socially, is the recently implemented personal growth program. This program is one of the many purposes of the Vickery Hall. This particular area of student development is designed to enhance and support the lives of student-athletes during their enrollment in college as well as in their life experiences after graduation.

Bobby Douglas, the Development Coordinator, and Vickery Hall staff realize that student-athletes have more obligations than a regular college student. The personal growth program seeks to eliminate some of the stresses of adjustment to the higher level of academics and athletics. It is the group's special task to assist the student-athlete by creating a finely tuned balance of all areas to ensure success in obtaining a Clemson University degree, by supporting successful athletic practice and competition, enhancing personal growth, and helping with the transition to life after college.

A series of personal growth programs will be offered to student-athletes throughout each semester. Some programs may accomplish their objectives in one session, while others may be ongoing throughout the academic year.

University Information



Clemson University was begun because of one man's dream. Thomas Green Clemson, renowned statesman and scientist, believed that education was the key to improving the quality of life for South Carolinians. Mr. Clemson left property and money to the state of South Carolina for the college he envisioned.

The doors to Clemson Agricultural College formally opened in 1893 with 446 students, 15 faculty members, one dormitory, and three classroom and administrative buildings. The college quickly became an important member of the national system of state universities and land-grant colleges. In 1955, the college changed from military to civilian status for students and became coeducational. In 1964, because of the college's expanded academic offerings and research pursuits, the Legislature formally changed the college's name to Clemson University.

Today, Clemson's 1,400-acre campus successfully combines modern academic and service structures with glimpses of the University's past. The university represents an insured value of approximately \$622 million in academic and administrative buildings; student, staff and faculty housing; athletic and service facilities; and equipment. The campus is situated on what was once Fort Hill Plantation, the homestead of Thomas Green Clemson and before him that of his father-in-law, John C. Calhoun. Landmarks such as Fort Hill, the former home of the Clemsons and Calhouns, Tillman Hall with its clocktower, the statue of Thomas Green Clemson and the outdoor theatre all help retain the air of tradition.

The Clemson Student

In 1993, 37 percent of Clemson's freshmen ranked in the top 10th of their high school class, while 64 percent were in the top fifth. The average Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of entering freshmen in 1993 was 1052. This means that a Clemson student's classmates provide challenge and excitement.

The tradition of high quality education at Clemson has long been known by employers and professional schools, and they actively recruit graduates. The liberal arts education Clemson offers is widely recognized for its emphasis on preparing students to succeed in a world where rapid change transforms every challenge into an opportunity.

Preparing students for life after graduation does not take place only in the classroom. Leadership programs, exposure to a rich cultural environment, contact with people from backgrounds and geographic regions different from the student's own life experience, opportunities to exchange ideas and to learn from these will give added value to the education that a Clemson student receives.

Clemson's student body is comprised of students from 49 different states and 74 foreign countries. Many different cultures and ethnic backgrounds are represented in the student population. This diversity adds to the many educational opportunities of the campus and the Clemson community.

The Clemson Education

Clemson's different colleges include Agriculture Sciences, Architecture, Commerce and In-

dustry, Education, Engineering, Forest and Recreation Resources, Liberal Arts, Nursing, and Sciences. In these nine colleges, 72 undergraduate programs and 70 graduate programs are offered. With the goal of maintaining the vision of Thomas Clemson, the school continues to place importance on the studies of agriculture, scientific, technological, and business courses. These courses and others help the Clemson student prepare for life in our fast-paced and changing society.

Calhoun College, the Clemson Honors Program, strives to enrich the educational experience of highly motivated, academically talented students by providing opportunities for scholarship and research not ordinarily available to undergraduates. Established in 1962, Calhoun College is the oldest and largest honors program in South Carolina.

Clemson classes are demanding and many of the academic programs have received national recognition. Clemson also has expanded educational programs in different communities around the state. The University has telecampus offerings and new joint programs with technical colleges, such as the new program in horticulture offered at Horry-Georgetown Technical College, a new degree program with The Citadel and academic programs at Lander and Furman.

Clemson University is a land-grant, state-assisted university accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award the bachelor's, master's, specialist and doctoral degrees.

The Clemson Faculty

Clemson faculty members represent a wide array of academic interests and diverse backgrounds. As a group, the faculty share a common interest in providing a positive learning experience for students. Also the faculty has a genuine interest in seeing their students realize success in their academic pursuits. Clemson's student-to-faculty ratio of 16-to-1 gives the faculty the opportunity to interact with many of their students on a one-to-one basis. Critical thinking, problem solving, creative learning, and self-development are just a few of the things emphasized in the Clemson classroom.

Faculty members at Clemson come from a wide range of backgrounds. Five hundred institutions of higher learning that promote excellence in teaching, research, and scholarship are represented among the Clemson faculty. Eighty-two percent hold earned doctoral degrees, and many have achieved special academic recognition. Many have also been honored by colleagues and students as master teachers for their excellence in the classroom and by the Outstanding Educators of America.

When a student enrolls at Clemson, the interaction between student and faculty solidifies as each student is assigned a faculty adviser in his or her chosen field of study. The faculty adviser will assist the student with class scheduling and academic counseling throughout his or her stay at Clemson as well.

The Clemson Facilities

Take a walk around the Clemson campus and you will see plenty of construction activity, whether it is finishing touches on the new performing arts

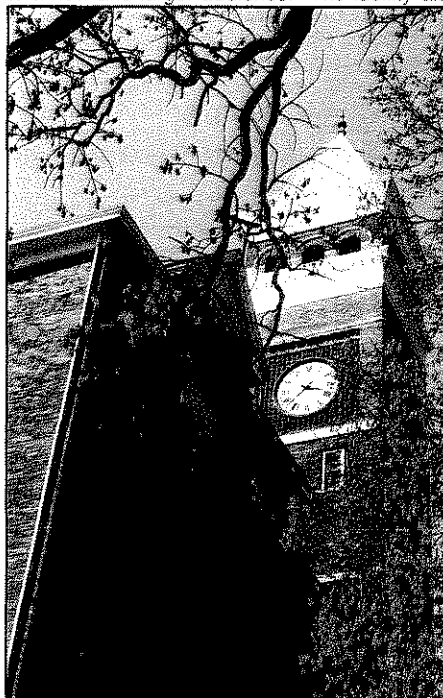
center or construction on the new engineering building, Clemson is definitely preparing to be a leader in the 21st century.

The main University library, Robert Muldrow Cooper Library, is situated in the heart of campus. The library has become one of the national leaders in automated information retrieval. Its bibliographic records are accessible from anywhere in the world electronically, easing the task of finding information in its collections, which total more than 1.7 million items. Numerous periodical indexes are housed on-line and available for automated searching. The collections are particularly strong in agriculture, natural and physical sciences, economics and technology. Of special interest are the James F. Brynes and Edgar A. Brown Rooms which have the collections of papers of these statesmen.

A cornerstone of the University is its computer facilities. Clemson's computer center, which supports student course work and research in all disciplines, is also used by government and industry. The center provides general computing services on a network. Remote sites housing more than 1,600 terminals and 600 microcomputers are conveniently located in many different areas of campus. International and national telephone modem access is also available.

All students are assigned a user identification code when they enroll, which allows them to use the various mainframe applications such as electronic mail, job placement service, library card catalog and information databases, and housing and course registration.

Final touches are being put on the already open \$12.5 million Robert Howell Brooks Center for the Performing Arts. The facility brings an exciting array of fine arts productions to the University, while working to make the arts accessible to a new and larger audience. The facility also

houses the rehearsal and performance space for Tiger Band.

Recently finished was the newest student residence facility, McCabe Hall. McCabe replaces a portion of Johnstone Hall and serves students with new updated comfortable dormitory living in an attractive building inside and out.

Currently under construction is the Flour Daniel Engineering Innovation Center. When completed it will be the first new engineering building built on the Clemson campus in 24 years.

The Office of Career Services and Placement can help with planning and finding summer and full-time employment. The office assists in career counseling and planning, searching for a job, preparing resumes and developing job interview strategies. Resources include staff expertise, books, videotapes and literature provided by companies and agencies. Clemson has developed one of the best automated placement systems in the country, allowing students to research employers and sign up for interviews from any mainframe computer terminals on campus.

The Office of Career Services doesn't just serve the needs of seniors; it serves all students and alumni. Interest tests and interactive computer programs help students explore their career interests. Also, if incoming freshmen are unsure about which major to choose, the Career Center can offer information on career choices, testing and interpretation for career direction.

Career Counselors will even help students with study techniques and self-development.

The Clemson Experience

Whether its walking to the Agriculture Sales Center to have a milkshake or taking a stroll through the Botanical Gardens or even taking part in a pick-up basketball game at Fike Recreation Center, there are plenty of activities for Clemson students when they are not in the classroom.

Clemson has more than 260 student organizations that are active on campus, including 19 social fraternities and 12 social sororities. There are organizations related to every course of study - groups such as the Accounting Club, the Society of Women Engineers, and the American Institute of Architects. For students who enjoy writing or photography, the *Tiger*, the campus newspaper, *TAPS*, the university yearbook; or the *Chronicle*, the student variety magazine, are available. For those who are interested in broadcasting there is a student-operated radio station, WSBF-FM, broadcasting news, information, and music 24 hours a day.

Located in the University Union are the offices of the student government. Student government gives students the opportunity to influence campus policy. Also in the University Union is the campus entertainment center. There are lounges,

bowling alleys, video games, billiard tables, and Edgar's all located at the campus entertainment center.

Fike Recreation Center has a host of opportunities for students to let off steam through physical activity. Inside Fike is an eight-lane swimming pool, a diving tank, two gyms used for basketball and other activities, various weight lifting facilities, and room for aerobics. Outside Fike are several spacious fields used for the extensive intramural program and for student enjoyment. There are indoor and lighted outdoor tennis courts across the street from Fike at the Hoke A. Sloan Tennis Center.

Clemson, SC



The signs on the side of the highway as you enter the Clemson city limits say "Clemson: In Season Every Season." From the point of view of most Clemson graduates, the seasons this slogan speaks of are football, basketball, baseball, etc. But a drive through town in the middle of spring, when the azaleas and dogwoods are in full bloom, or a walk through campus in October, when the trees are blazing in the brilliant colors of autumn, will leave little doubt that Clemson is indeed in season, every season.

Nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains and caressed by the shores of the beautiful Lake Hartwell, Clemson is located in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, two hours north of Atlanta, GA, and two hours southwest of Charlotte, NC. The town may not be one of the state's largest most days of the week, but on many autumn Saturdays, it becomes the state's second-largest city, as 81,000 fans come from all directions to watch the Tigers play football. But the friendly residents of Clemson and the surrounding towns welcome the visitors home each year with a true dose of southern hospitality.

Clemson is steeped in history. The university campus is located on what was Fort Hill Plantation, home of John C. Calhoun, one of the great statesmen of the 19th century, and of his son-in-law, Thomas Green Clemson. The house, which was built in 1806, stands in the center of campus and is open to the public. Also on the Clemson campus is a 1716 lowcountry French Huguenot home, Hanover House, which was transported to Clemson in 1941. Just a mile or so down the road, is the Pendleton Historic District, where several other antebellum homes are open to the public. The entire village of Pendleton is on the National Register of Historic Places.

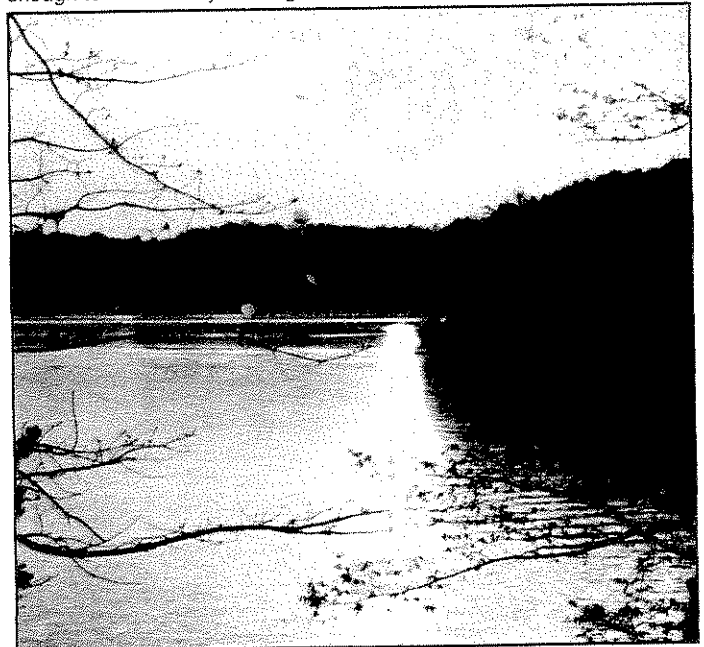
The area boasts a great variety of restaurants, ranging from the downtown barbeque and hamburger spots, to the historic Liberty Hall Inns and Calhoun Corners. Any palate or budget can find something to his or her liking, as over 50 eating establishments are located in the Clemson/Pendleton/Central area.

The mild climate of the foothills lends itself to many outdoor activities throughout the year. Clemson has excellent and ample facilities for tennis and golf, fishing, swimming or hiking, horseback riding, white water rafting, and various other pursuits.

And, when one wants to leave Clemson, they don't have far to go to find whatever they are looking for. Professional sports are only a couple of hours away in Atlanta and Charlotte. Clemson will be the home of the NFL's

Carolina Panthers for eight regular season and two exhibition games in 1995.

For sun and fun, its an easy interstate drive to the coast of South Carolina, to Hilton Head Island, Myrtle Beach, or even historic Charleston. All kinds of water sports are right at the campus' back door, as a 926-mile shoreline borders the edge of campus. And for those who enjoy cooler climates, the mountains of North Carolina are only an hour's drive away. Countless resorts and some of the finest ski slopes in the east are close enough to make a day's outing.

Tiger Facilities



JERVEY ATHLETIC CENTER

The Jervey Athletic Center - named in honor of one of Clemson's most beloved sons, Frank Jervey - is a two-level complex that is the home of the University's intercollegiate athletic program.

The 67,000 square foot building houses under one roof, offices for all of the coaching and related staffs for the 19 Clemson sports, a unique feature that places the center among the most modern of its kind anywhere. These offices are centrally located on the main level and underwent a \$500,000 renovation in 1989. The facility is expanding, a two-million dollar project that should be completed in the spring of 1995.

Within the complex is found all of the personnel and related facilities needed to conduct an effective, top-flight intercollegiate athletic program.

The main entrance opens into a spacious lobby-reception area where trophy display cases and other memorabilia of Clemson athletics are displayed.

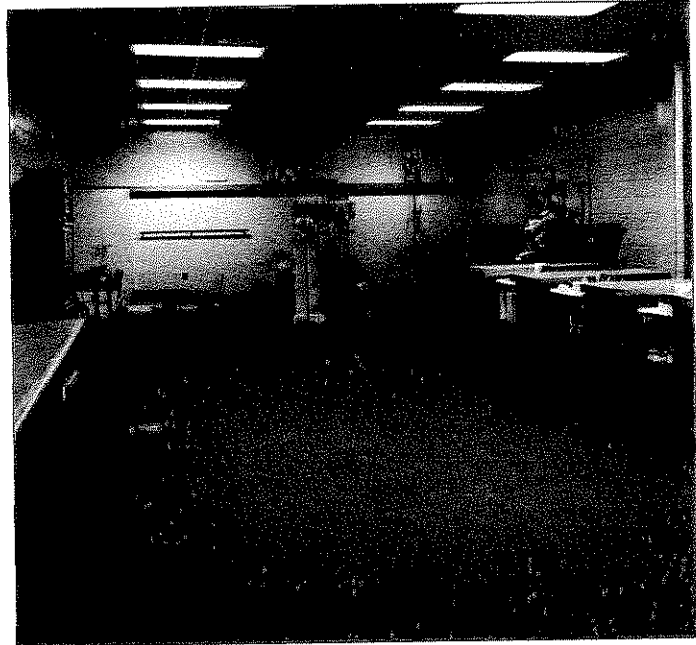
Besides the coaching staffs the 50-plus offices on the main level are used by personnel in administrative and sports information personnel. Also on this level are three squad rooms, three conference rooms, a central mailing room, film storage and staff lounge area.

Beneath the main floor are located dressing rooms for all varsity sports. Other facilities on this level include coaches' dressing rooms, a spacious training room, sauna and steam rooms, and athletic equipment room.

Attached to and complementing the administrative-coaching personnel building is a two-level, multi-purpose structure of 29,000 square feet. The upper level of this building is where the Jervey Gym is located. This 3,500 seat arena serves as home for Clemson's Wrestling team. The lower level of the gymnasium houses the strength training room.

Clemson's training facility, located on the lower level of the Jervey Athletic Center, is also among the finest in the nation. Supervising the medical needs of over 400 Clemson athletes in the training room is Assistant Athletic Director and Head Trainer Fred Hoover.

The Jervey Athletic Center provides the Tiger athletes with the most modern and up-to-date facilities in the country. It's one reason the Clemson athletic program is recognized as one of the best in America.

WEIGHT ROOM

Clemson University has one of the finest weight rooms in the nation. The 11,000 square foot facility includes over 12 tons of free weight and two full lines of Nautilus equipment. Next year the facility will be expanded to 14,000 square feet.

The plush atmosphere includes wall-to-wall carpeting, walls lined with mirrors, ceiling fans, and a 26-speaker sound system - a worthy backdrop for well over \$500,000 worth of state-of-the-art weight equipment.

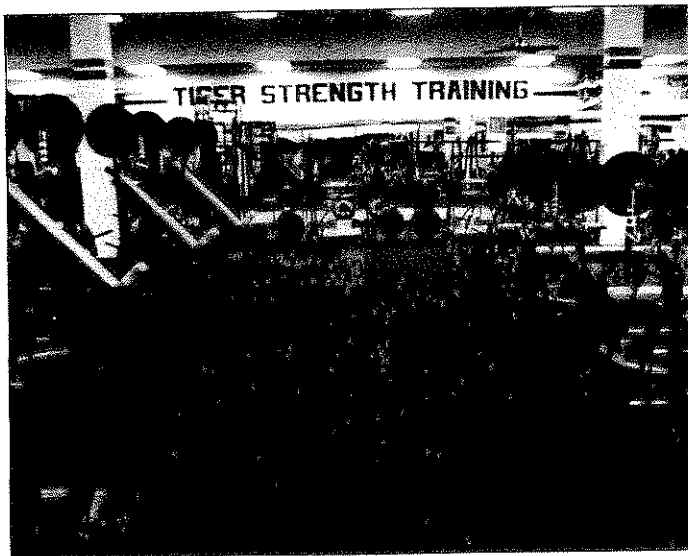
Four color television monitors are also positioned throughout the facility. These monitors are used for training and instruction, as Tiger strength coaches film the athletes and work with them on from correction.

Now in his 10th year as Director of the Clemson Strength and Conditioning Program is Gary Wade. Wade brings a great deal of experience with him to Clemson. He served as an assistant strength coach at Nebraska for three years as an undergraduate and graduate student. He earned his undergraduate degree in 1978 and worked on his graduate degree in exercise science until 1979. In January, 1980, he became the Detroit Lions' first strength and conditioning coach. During his days in the Motor City, the Lions made the playoffs twice and won the NFC Central in 1983, the first time in 26 years. He served in this capacity until being named strength and conditioning coach at Clemson on January 11, 1985.

Nine former Clemson assistant strength coaches under Wade have been named coaches at other schools, and four are currently head coaches on the collegiate level. John Sauer (William & Mary), Joey Batson (Furman), Joel St. Cyr, (Northeastern), John Marcotte (Springfield) and Jeff Fish (Kent State) are head strength coaches.

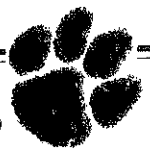
Former Clemson assistant strength coach Jeff Hurd is currently with the Kansas City Chiefs of the National Football League.

Wade is assisted this year by Dennis Scott, J.T. Allaire, Ryan Cole, Todd Wright and Kevin Handzel. A strength training coach is assigned to each sport to ensure proper training by the athletes.

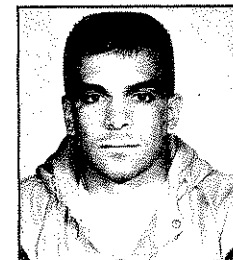

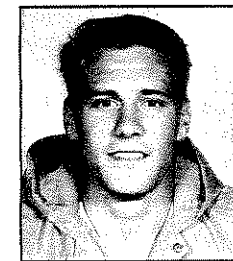

1993-94 Season in Review



✓ **THE SEASON-** The Clemson wrestling team finished the 1993-94 season with a 14-6 record and a 3-2 mark in the Atlantic Coast Conference. It is the seventh year in a row that the wrestling team has won 10 or more matches in a season. The Tigers tied the school record for most victories at home with a 9-1 record.

✓ **CLEMSON FINISHES SEVENTH AT THE NCAA TOURNAMENT-** The Clemson Wrestling team finished in seventh place at the NCAA Wrestling Tournament held in Chapel Hill, NC.

The seventh-place finish is the highest team finish in Tiger wrestling history and the fourth top-20 finish in the history of the program. Head Coach Gil Sanchez, in his second season at the helm, has led the squad to the top two finishes in the program's history with a 13th-place finish in 1993 and the seventh-place finish in 1994.

Clemson was led by Sam Henson who captured his second national championship in as many years at the 118 pound weight class. The two time All-American went 6-0 in the NCAA Tournament and finished the season with a 37-0 record. In his two seasons at Clemson, the senior from St. Charles, MO compiled a 71-0 record.

Tim Morrissey also earned All-America honors going 4-1 in the NCAA Tournament. The Glenwood Springs, CO native finished third in the NCAA Tournament at the 190-pound weight class. Morrissey finished the season at 31-5 and ends his career at Clemson with a 61-10 mark.

✓ **TIGERS TAKE SECOND AT THE ACC TOURNAMENT-**

The Clemson Tigers captured second place at the ACC Tournament held in Charlottesville, Virginia on March 5th. North Carolina was first with 107 team points followed by Clemson with 66.5.

Clemson had three individual champions. Sam Henson (118) and Tim Morrissey (190) repeated as ACC Champions and Mike Mammon (150) won for the first time in his career. Clemson heavyweight Keith Turner took second place and Jeff Stephens (126) and John Gardner (177) each captured third.

It was only the third time that Clemson finished second in the ACC Tournament, and the 66.5 team points are the third most points ever recorded by a Clemson team at the ACC Tournament.

✓ **ALL-AMERICANS-** For the second time in the history of the Clemson wrestling program there were two Tigers named All-American. Sam Henson, the National Champion at the 118 pound weight class, and Tim Morrissey, who finished third at the 190 pound weight class, earned All-America honors last year. Prior to the 1993-94 season there were six wrestlers named All-American in the history of the program, including Sam Henson in 1993.

✓ **RECORD SETTING PERFORMANCES IN 1993-94-**

After going 37-0 during the 1993-94 season and 34-0 the year before, Henson holds the top spot in Clemson's record book for career winning percentage with a 100% mark. He is also tied for 13th for wins in a career at Clemson with 71. With his 37 wins last year, Sam Henson is tied for second in Clemson's record book for both wins in a season by a Clemson wrestler and for wins by a senior in a season. He also holds the first and second place spots for wins by a 118 pounder in a season at Clemson with 37 and 34, respectively. The two-time National Champion is tied for 14th in career wins

while at Clemson.

Tim Morrissey had an outstanding year at the 190 pound weight class. The All-American won 31 matches, which is the most wins in a season by a 190 pounder at Clemson and sixth most by a senior at Clemson. He also had 11 pins last year, which places him second for pins in a season by a 190 pounder and third for pins by a senior. His winning percentage of .861 is tied for sixth best by a Tiger during a season and his .859 career mark is the third best percentage in Clemson's history.

John Gardner's 18 victories ties for sixth place in the Clemson record book for wins at the 177 weight class. Gardner finished third at the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament at the 177 pound weight class.

Mike Mammon's 21 victories last year put him in fifth place for wins at the 150 pound weight class. Those 21 wins gave him 78 victories over his four-year career at Clemson, which is the 10th best career mark at Clemson.

Jeff Stephens, who also captured third at the ACC Tournament, won 16 matches, which is the 10th best for wins by a Clemson wrestler at the 126 pound weight class.

✓ **TIGER RECEIVES CONFERENCE AND SCHOOL**

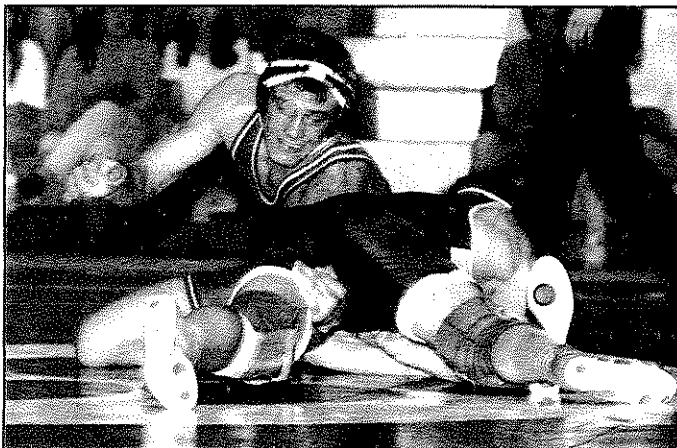
HONORS- Clemson wrestler Sam Henson was named Atlantic Coast Conference Wrestler-of-the-Year and IPTAY Athlete-of-the-Year. Henson is the fourth Tiger to receive the ACC honor as Todd Sterr (1982), Joey McKenna (1986), and Donnie Heckel (1991) have each won the award. Noel Loban is the only other Clemson wrestler to be IPTAY Athlete of the year.

✓ **STEPHENS ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN-** Jeff Stephens was named first team Academic All-American by the National Wrestling Coaches Association. As a team the Tigers finished 17th in the nation.

✓ **BUCKLEY NAMED TO THE ALL-ROOKIE TEAM-**

Brendan Buckley was named a fourth-team all-rookie performer by *Amateur Wrestling News* last year. Buckley won 18 matches, the most by a Clemson freshman in three years.

✓ **HENSON AN ALL-STAR-** Sam Henson became the first Tiger wrestler to compete in the National All-Star meet which includes the two top ranked wrestlers returning from the previous year's NCAA Tournament. Henson beat Iowa State's Eric Akin 4-2 in the match.



Tim Morrissey joined Sam Henson as an All-American in 1994 with a third-place finish in the NCAA Tournament.

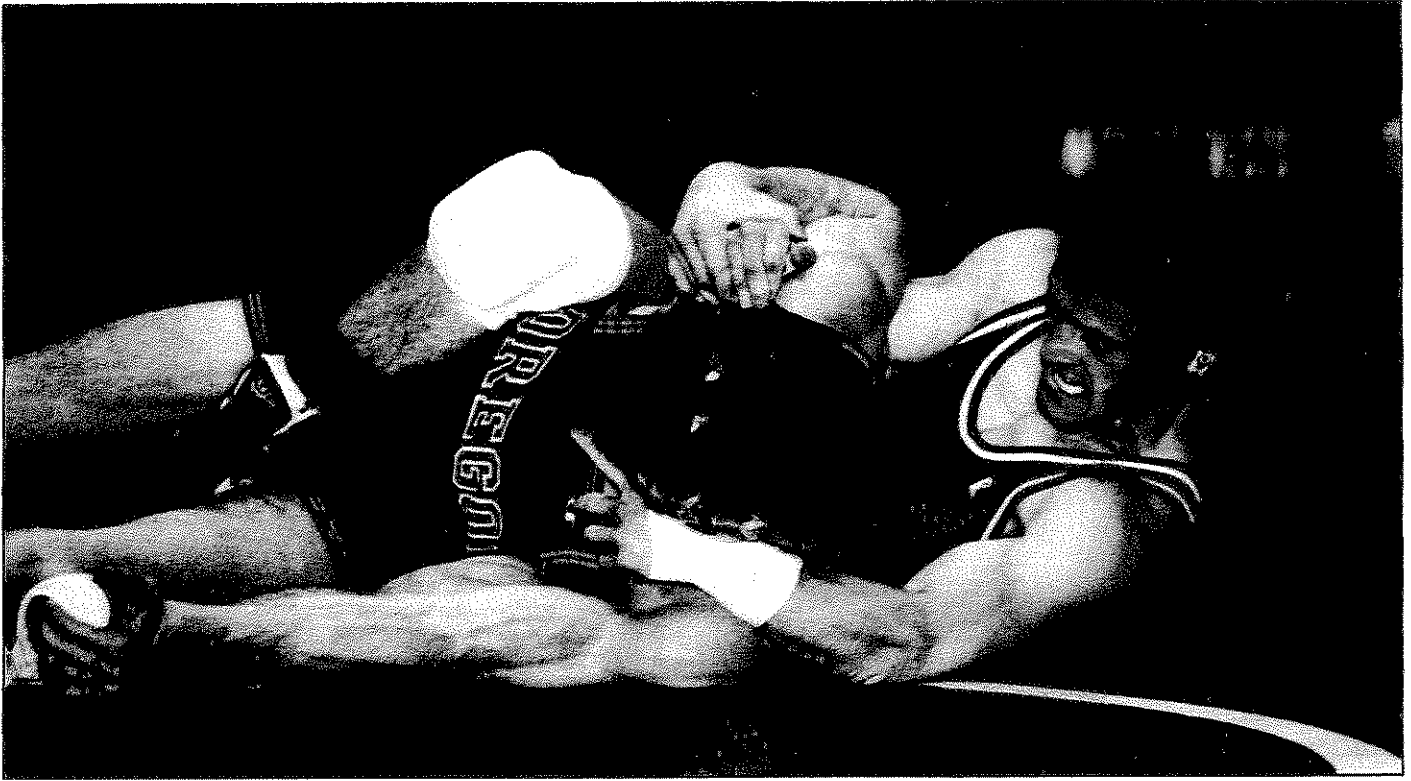

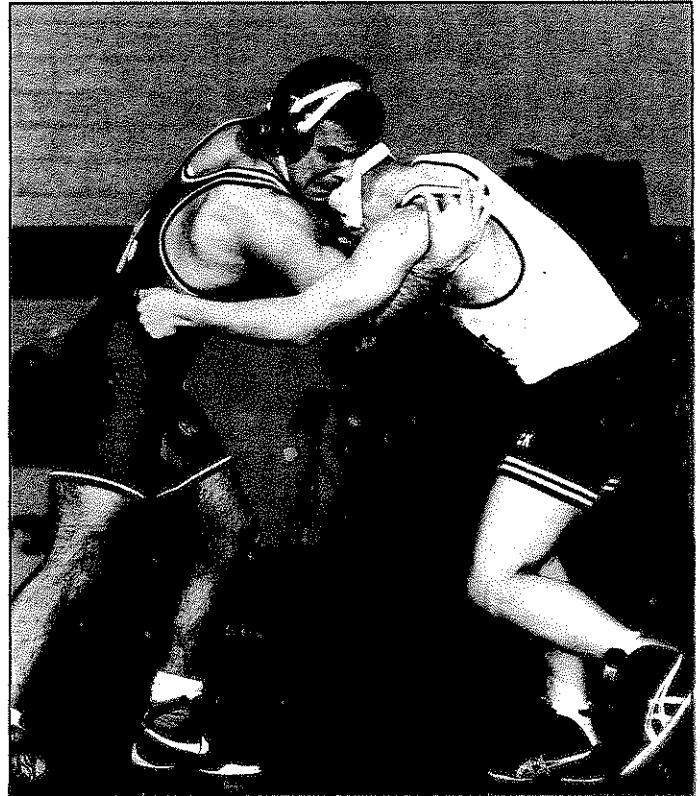

*Clemson had nine teams rank among the final top 25 in either the final poll, or NCAA meet/tournament events. The highest ranked team was the baseball team, which finished fourth in the final **Baseball America** poll. The Clemson soccer team advanced to the NAAs and was fifth in the final poll, the wrestling team was seventh, the golf team was ninth, the men's track team was 11th, the Lady Tiger tennis team was 18th in the final poll, the women's basketball team was 22nd (**USA Today** poll), the football team 22nd (**USA Today** poll), and the men's indoor track team was 24th.

*The final Sears All-Sports poll ranked the Clemson all-round sports program 16th in the nation. Clemson's fine spring of top 11 finishes in baseball, track and golf had a lot to do with that fine ranking.

*Clemson defeated the number-one team in two different sports in 1993-94. The Tiger soccer team defeated number-one Virginia in Charlottesville on a goal at the buzzer by All-American Jimmy Glenn. The Clemson baseball team defeated Georgia Tech (ranked number-one by **Baseball America**) twice in Atlanta in May. It was just the second time in Clemson history that the Tigers had beaten the number-one team in two different sports in the same year. *Nine different sports that compete in dual meet or match competition had at least one win over a top 25 opponent during the 1993-94 academic year.

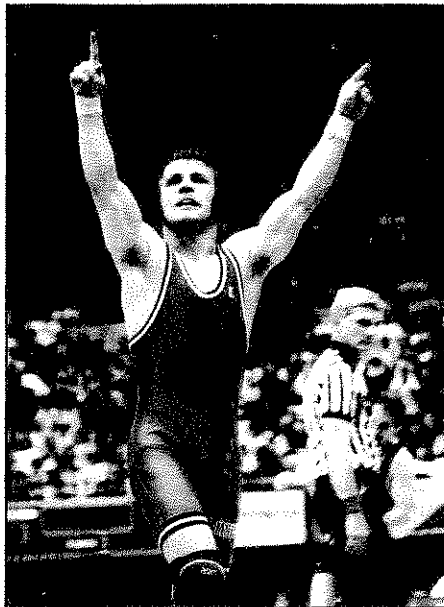
*It was a showcase year for Clemson's facilities. For the first time in history, Clemson played host to NCAA Championship events in three different sports. Clemson played host to the volleyball and soccer tournaments in the Fall, and the baseball tournament in the Spring.

*Clemson had a solid year in football, basketball and baseball, the school's oldest and most traditional sports. **Clemson went to postseason play in all three sports and was one of just two schools in the nation to win at least nine football games, 18 basketball games and 36 baseball games.** Florida was the only other school in the nation to do it. It was just the eighth time in Clemson history and the first time in five years that Clemson has been to postseason play in all three of its oldest sports in the same academic year.

*All but two of Clemson's teams had what would be termed a winning season and five of the teams that participate in head-to-head competition won at least 70 percent of their games.

*The Clemson football team posted a 9-3 record and was ranked 22nd in the final **USA Today** poll. It is the seventh time in the last eight years that Clemson has been ranked in the final top 25 poll. Clemson is one of just seven schools who have been ranked in the final poll seven of the last eight years. The other schools are Miami (FL), Nebraska, Michigan, Texas A&M, Florida State and Notre Dame.

*The Clemson baseball team reached the number-one ranking on May 2, 1994, the first time in Clemson history that the baseball team was ranked number-one by itself. (Clemson was tied for first in a poll during the 1977 season.) Clemson held the number-one ranking for four weeks in May and led the nation in total victories with 57. The 57 wins included 19 wins over top 25 teams,

a Clemson record for one season regardless of sport. Jack Leggett's team won the regular season and ACC Tournament. Leggett was named ACC Coach of the Year.

*The men's track team once again had the most All-America selections. Coach Bob Pollock's team had five All-America selections in indoor track and five in outdoor track.

*Clemson's volleyball team had a landmark season as it was chosen for the NCAA Tournament for the first time. The team finished with a 27-8 record, which tied for the highest winning percentage of any Clemson team in 1993-94. Robbin Kibben was a first-team All-ACC performer.

*The Clemson golf team advanced to the NCAA national tournament for the 13th straight year, one of only four schools in the nation who can make that claim. Clemson is one of just three programs to rank in the top 15 at the NCAA Golf Championship for seven straight years.

*The Women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA tournament for the seventh straight season, the second longest string of NCAA appearances among Clemson sports and the longest active streak among women's sports at Clemson. Jim Davis was named ACC Coach of the Year, while Jessica Barr was named ACC Player of the Year.

*Sam Henson had the standout individual accomplishment among Clemson athletes in 1993-94 as he won his second straight NCAA wrestling championship. Henson completed his Clemson career at the 118-pound category with a perfect 71-0 record.

*Clemson soccer player Jimmy Glenn led the nation in goal scoring, just the second Clemson soccer player in history to lead the nation in scoring.

*Shane Monahan was a first-team All-American on the baseball diamond and he led the nation in total hits with 137. He was just five hits away from

the all-time NCAA record. Monahan hit .415 for the season and was the MVP of the ACC Tournament, which Clemson won in Greenville, SC. Teammate Mike Hampton was also a first-team All-American.

*Mark Swygert finished in a tie for third at the NCAA golf tournament in June and earned All-America selection. It was the second straight year that Swygert finished in the top 10 at the national event, the first Clemson golfer in history to do that.

*Offensive guard Stacy Seegars was chosen a first-team AP All-American and appeared on the Bob Hope Christmas Special. It was the second straight year Seegars had been chosen to an All-America football team.

*Men's basketball player Sharone Wright was a second-team All-ACC selection and led Clemson to the quarterfinals of the NIT. Wright, who ranked in the top 20 nationally in rebounding and blocked shots, was the number-six choice in the NBA draft by the Philadelphia 76ers.

*Clemson hurdler Duane Ross was an All-American in indoor and outdoor track and had the fastest time in the world in the 110 high hurdles.

*Women's basketball player Jessica Barr brought much attention to the Clemson women's basketball program. She became Clemson's first Kodak All-American in 12 years and was named the MVP of the ACC. She was honored as the female athlete-of-the-year in the state of South Carolina.

*Boba Tzvetkova reached the final eight of the NCAA women's singles tournament and earned All-America honors. She was ranked 17th in the final NCAA singles poll released on June 15.

*Clemson football player Warren Forney was the recipient of the Sullivan Award, one of the top honors bestowed upon a Clemson student. It is presented for service to others.

*Jaro Zawislaw won the ACC's Jim Weaver Award as one of the top all-around student-athletes in
